INFORMATION FOR VOTERS

The Elections Office offers full service for voters Monday through Friday, 8 AM – 5 PM, and on these weekends and holidays:

October 8 th	9 AM – 4 PM
October 27 th /28 th	9 AM – 4 PM
November 3 rd /4 th	9 AM – 4 PM

★ **DAMAGED BALLOTS:** If you incorrectly mark, tear or deface any portion of your ballot sheet, place the sheet in the secrecy folder and return it to the election officer. A replacement ballot will be issued. If you are voting by mail and you need a replacement ballot, please contact the Placer County Elections Office (numbers are listed on the front cover) for instructions.

★ **IF YOU LOSE YOUR BALLOT:** If you lose or discard your vote by mail ballot, you may request a replacement ballot to be sent to you or vote a ballot at the Placer County Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 8, 2018. Contact the Elections Office (numbers are listed on the front cover) for more information.

★ **VOTING AT THE POLLING PLACE:** After you have completed voting, look over your choices one final time to be sure they are correct, place your ballot in the secrecy folder and deposit the ballot into the ballot counting machine. Once your ballot has been deposited into the machine, it cannot be retrieved.

★ **VOTING BY MAIL:** After you have completed voting, look over your choices one final time to be sure they are correct and place your ballot in the return envelope provided. Be sure to sign and date the envelope where required. The envelope must have your signature on it or the ballot cannot be counted. Return the envelope according to the instructions you received with your ballot. If you wish to return your voted ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, November 6th, and received by the Elections Office no later than Friday, November 9th, in order for your ballot to count. We encourage you to mail your ballot on or before October 31st so it may arrive on time. If you wish to return your voted ballot in person, it must be hand-delivered on or before 8:00 PM on Election Day. For your convenience, the Elections Office in Auburn has a 24-hour drive-up drop-off ballot box and there are additional ballot drop-off locations in Placer County – see page DRP for details.

★ **OPTIONS FOR RECEIVING YOUR VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE:** You have a choice in how you receive your voter information guide, State law (AB 1717) allows voters to “go green” by choosing to opt-out of receiving their voter information guide by mail, and accessing them electronically instead. Party Endorsements

The Top-Two Candidates Open Primary Act was approved by the voters in June 2010 and the implementation of the Act was directed by the approval of SB 6 (Chapter 1, Statutes of 2009), and AB 1413 (Chapter 3, Statutes of 2012). Pursuant to Elections Code Section 13302(b) a qualified party may submit to the county elections official a list of all candidates for voter-nominated office who will appear on a ballot in the county in question, and who have been endorsed by the party. Further, the county elections official shall print the names of the candidates for voter-nominated office who were endorsed by that political party in the voter information portion of the sample ballot. *The endorsements listed below may be from a different political party than the candidate prefers. See the sample ballot enclosed to view the candidates' political party preference.*

VOTER FILE MAINTENANCE INFORMATION

If no confirmation is received by the voter, he/she may be required to provide proof of residence in order to vote at future elections. IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY PLACER COUNTY COUNSEL

This measure, if approved by fifty-five percent of the voters voting thereon, would authorize the sale of general obligation bonds by the Placer Union School District (herein, the "District") for School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 in the amount of up to \$42,100,000 (forty-two million one hundred thousand dollars) in aggregate principal amount. The proceeds of the bonds would be used within School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 for the purposes described in the text of Measure G, which precedes this analysis. Principal and interest on the bonds would be paid from a tax placed on the taxable property within the District. The District's estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue follows this analysis.

A general obligation bond is a form of borrowing used to fund school facilities. By law, local general obligation bonds, financed through an increase in local property taxes, can be used for renovating, reconstructing, and building new facilities and for acquiring certain new equipment. To authorize such bond issuance, school districts can seek either two-thirds or 55% voter approval. If districts seek the 55% approval, as has been done by the District in this case, they must meet additional accountability requirements.

In order to meet these additional accountability requirements, the District Board of Trustees has committed to the following:

- use of bond proceeds shall be only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure, and not for administrators' or teachers' salaries or pensions;
- safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs have been evaluated prior to determining that bond issuance was necessary;

- independent performance audits of the expenditure of the bond proceeds will be conducted annually to ensure the bond funds were expended only on the specific identified projects and;
- independent financial audits of the expenditure of the bond proceeds will be conducted annually until all bond proceeds have been expended, and;
- a Citizens' Oversight Committee will be established to monitor expenditure of bond proceeds.

The District has confirmed that the proposed bonds would bear interest at a rate not exceeding the statutory limit per annum and the maturity of the bonds will not exceed the statutory maximum.

A "YES" vote on this Measure would authorize the District to borrow money through the sale of bonds in an amount not exceeding \$42,100,000, such bonds to be repaid by revenue derived from an annual tax levied upon the taxable property within School Facilities Improvement District No. 1.

A "NO" vote on this Measure is a vote against authorizing the sale of bonds by the District.

This analysis is submitted by the Office of the County Counsel of Placer County pursuant to the requirements of Section 9500 of the Elections Code of the State of California.

FULL TEXT OF MEASURE G SUBMITTED BY THE DISTRICT

INTRODUCTION

The Board of Trustees ("Board") of the Placer Union High School District ("District") is committed to maintaining Placer High School's tradition of excellence and of preparing students to be college, career and life-ready by the time they graduate. However, State budget cuts have reduced funding in the District by \$32 Million over the past five years, leaving the District without sufficient funds to adequately maintain Placer High School, which was built nearly 80 years ago and is in need of facility repairs and improvements. The types of facility repairs and improvements that are needed at Placer High School include fixing leaking roofs and

decaying walls; updating broken plumbing and bathrooms; upgrading air conditioning, heating, electrical systems and wiring for computer technology; making accessibility improvements for students with disabilities; and upgrading equipment, technology and classrooms for the vocational and career education programs.

The District has conducted a project prioritization process with input from parents, teachers, staff and members of the community to identify the upgrades needed at Placer High School in order to meet modern safety standards, the District's goals for supporting current academic standards and address specific priorities.

The Board has determined that a local source of funding, such as a school facilities improvement district bond measure, is the only way to provide funds that can then be used to repair and improve the aging facilities at Placer High School and ensure that the high quality of education at Placer High School is maintained. The bond proceeds from a school facilities improvement district bond would be used to repair and replace deteriorating classrooms to attract and retain highly qualified teachers; repair leaky roofs, gas lines, plumbing and bathrooms; maintain safe drinking water; upgrade science, math, computer and engineering labs to help prepare students for college and careers; upgrade security and safety systems, including safety doors, smoke alarms and smoke detectors; and provide space and technology to prepare students for available local jobs in fields such as agriculture, business, engineering and law enforcement.

Any such Board-approved local school facilities improvement district bond measure would ensure that bond proceeds are only used for Placer High School and not for other schools; would provide bond proceeds that could not be taken away by the State; would include mandatory taxpayer protections, including a Citizens' Oversight Committee and mandatory, independent annual audits to ensure funds are spent as promised; and provide that no bond funds could ever be used for administrators' or teachers' salaries or pensions.

In addition, a local school facilities improvement district bond measure, if approved by the voters, would enable the District to qualify for millions of dollars of State matching funds.

Whether or not the residents of the Placer High School enrollment area have school-age children, improving our local high school will help make the community a more desirable place to live, do business and raise a family, all of which will enhance property values and help to keep our community strong.

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this proposition by at least 55 percent of the registered voters voting on the measure within Placer High School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 of the Placer Union High School District ("SFID No. 1"), the Placer Union High School District (the "District") will be authorized to issue and sell bonds on behalf of SFID No. 1 of up to \$42.1 Million in aggregated principal at interest rates not in excess of the legal limit and to provide financing for the specific projects listed in the Bond Project List described below, subject to all the accountability requirements specified below.

The Bonds may be issued under the provisions of the California Education Code (starting at Section 15100), under the provisions of the California Government Code (starting at Section 53506), or under any other provision of law authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds by school districts. The Bonds may be issued in series by the District from time to time, and each series of Bonds shall mature within the legal limitations set forth in the applicable law under which the Bonds are issued.

FINANCING PLAN

The District intends to use the Bonds to modernize, renovate, construct, upgrade, equip, furnish and otherwise improve Placer High School, as set forth on the Bond Project List. No series of Bonds will be issued if such issuance would cause the tax rate levied to pay debt service on all of the outstanding Bonds to exceed the Proposition 39 limits per one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of taxable property, based on projections made by the District at the time of issuance of such series of Bonds.

In preparing this information, the District obtained reasonable and informed projections of assessed property valuation that took into consideration projections of assessed property valuations made by the County Assessor, if any, in accordance with Education Code Section 15100(c).

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this proposition in order that the voters and taxpayers in SFID No. 1 may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facility needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following).

Evaluation of Needs. The Board of Trustees of the District (the "Board of Trustees") has identified detailed facility needs of the District and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond at this time. The Board of Trustees hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List shown below.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. The Board of Trustees shall establish an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee under Education Code Section 15278 and following to ensure that bond proceeds are expended only on the school facilities projects listed below. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the Board of Trustees.

Performance Audits. The Board of Trustees shall conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List below.

Financial Audits. The Board of Trustees shall conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects described in the Bond Project List below.

Annual Report. The Assistant Superintendent, Business Services of the District will cause an annual report to be filed with the Board of Trustees, the first report to be filed not later than one year after the issuance of the first

series of the bonds, which report will contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in this measure, as required by applicable California law.

Expenditure of Bond Proceeds. The proceeds from the sale of the SFID No. 1's bonds will be used only for the purposes specified in this measure, and not for any other purpose. Such proceeds will be deposited into a Project Fund to be held by the Placer County Treasurer, as required by the California Education Code.

FURTHER SPECIFICATIONS

No Administrator Salaries. Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition shall be used only for the school facilities projects on the Bond Project List below, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

Single Purpose. All of the purposes enumerated in this proposition shall be united and voted upon as one single proposition, pursuant to Section 15100 of the California Education Code, and all the enumerated purposes shall constitute the specific single purpose of the bonds and proceeds of the bonds shall be spent only for such purpose.

Other Terms of the Bonds. The bonds may be issued and sold in several series, and in accordance with a financing plan determined by the Board of Trustees pursuant to requirements of law.

BOND PROJECT LIST

The Board of Trustees of the Placer Union High School District is committed to protecting the quality of education at Placer High School with safe, secure, upgraded classrooms and labs so that all students are prepared for college and/or good paying jobs. To that end, the Board evaluated the District's facility's needs and prepared a comprehensive 2016 Facilities Master Plan to develop the scope of projects to be funded. The Board, in developing the project list and priorities, solicited input from parents, teachers, staff and community and civic leaders.

Proceeds of the Bonds will be used to upgrade, repair, construct, renovate, furnish and equip schools, facilities and classrooms (as listed below) at Placer High School. The exact size, configuration and location of each project will be determined by the Board of Trustees based on the needs of the District.

Major repairs, renovations, improvements, constructions and equipment acquisitions shall include but not be limited to:

- Expand STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) classrooms
- Renovate and expand Earl Crabbe Gym complex
- Upgrade, renovate, and improve classrooms and classroom buildings

- Construct new classrooms
- Renovate Student Union
- Modernize and expand cafeteria
- Upgrade fire alarm and emergency communication systems
- Renovate Career Technical Education (CTE) facilities
- Construct lunch shelter
- Upgrade performing arts facility infrastructure and equipment
- Make handicap accessibility (ADA) upgrades and improvements
- Roofing repairs or replacement
- Building system upgrades (HVAC, mechanical, electrical, & plumbing)
- Address unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/renovation (e.g., asbestos removal, plumbing or gas line repairs, dry rot, seismic, structural, etc.)
- Improve campus security, which includes but is not limited to fencing and surveillance cameras

Scope of Projects. The Projects which are described above include all related and incidental costs, including their share of the costs of the election and bond issuance and costs of design, engineering, architect and other professional services, inspections, site preparation, site allowance, demolition, utilities, and other planning, legal, accounting and similar costs, independent annual financial and performance audits, a customary contingency, and other costs incidental to and necessary for completion of the listed Projects.

In addition to the Projects listed above, the repair and renovation of each of the existing school facilities may include, but not be limited to, some or all of the following: renovate student and staff restrooms; installation of signage, clocks, bells and fencing; repair and replace heating and ventilation systems; upgrade of facilities for energy efficiencies; repair and replace worn-out and deteriorated roofs, windows, walls, doors and drinking fountains; improve school facilities for disability access; install wiring and electrical systems to safely accommodate computers, technology and other electrical devices and needs; upgrade support facilities, repair and replace gas, water and sewer systems and lines, fire alarms, emergency communications and security systems; resurface or replace hard courts, asphalt, turf and irrigation systems and campus landscaping; interior and exterior painting and floor covering; demolition; construct various forms of storage and support spaces and classrooms; repair, upgrade and install interior and exterior lighting systems; improve or reconstruct playgrounds, athletic fields and play apparatus; and replace outdated security fences and security systems (including access control systems).

The scope and nature of any of the specific Projects described may be altered by the District as required by unforeseen conditions that may arise during the course of design and construction. In the event that a modernization or renovation project will result in higher

costs than relocation and construction, this bond measure authorizes land acquisition, relocation and reconstruction, and all costs relating thereto, for said reasons or based on other considerations deemed in the best interest of the District by the Board of Trustees. In addition, this measure authorizes the acquisition of real property required to expand or provide school facility projects at Placer High School. Bond proceeds may also be expended to acquire equipment in any classroom or other educational facility within the District. Property, buildings and equipment on the Project list may be acquired through lease, sale, lease-purchase, lease-leaseback or other project delivery or acquisition methods determined appropriate by the Board of Trustees.

The District may alter the scope and nature of any of the specific projects that are described above as required by conditions that arise over time. Whenever specific items are included in the Project list, they are presented to

provide examples and are not intended to limit the generality of the broader description of authorized projects. The order in which particular projects are listed is not intended to indicate priority for funding or completion. The itemization of projects in the list does not guarantee that all such projects will be undertaken.

Projects Subject to Available Funding. The foregoing list of projects is subject to the availability of adequate funding to the District for Placer High School. Approval of the bond measure does not guarantee that the proposed projects at Placer High School that are the subject of bonds under the measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the bond measure. The District plans to pursue funds from the State of California, if available, to complete certain of the identified Projects. The District's proposal for the Projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

TAX RATE STATEMENT PREPARED BY THE DISTRICT

An election will be held within the boundaries of Placer High School Facilities Improvement District No. 1 of the Placer Union School District ("SFID No. 1") on November 6, 2018 to authorize the sale of up to \$42.1 Million in bonds to finance facilities as described in the proposition. If the bonds are approved, the School District expects to sell the bonds in multiple series. Principal and interest on the bonds will be payable from the proceeds of tax levies made upon the taxable property located within SFID No. 1. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the California Elections Code.

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.02663 per \$100 (\$26.63 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation. The final fiscal year in which the tax to be levied to fund this bond issue is anticipated to be collected is fiscal year 2049-50.

2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$0.03 per \$100 (\$30.00 per \$100,000) of assessed valuation in fiscal year 2019-20.

3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$75,847,303.

Voters should note that the estimated tax rates are based on the *ASSESSED VALUE* of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls, not on the property's market value. Taxpayers eligible for property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described

above, and certain taxpayers may be eligible for a postponement of their property taxes. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

Attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon the District's projections and estimates only, which are not binding upon the District, nor are the summary estimates, if any, provided in the Abbreviated Ballot Measure. The actual tax rates, debt service, and the years in which they will apply may vary from those presently estimated, due to variations from these estimates in the timing of bond sales, the amount of bonds sold and market interest rates at the time of each sale, and actual assessed valuations over the term of repayment of the bonds.

The dates of sale and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for construction funds and other factors, including the legal limitations on bonds approved by a 55% vote. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on the bond market at the time of each sale. Actual future assessed valuation will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

A precinct board consists of an Inspector, Judge and Clerks. Training is available and mandatory for Inspectors and Judges. You must be able to work from 6:00 AM to 9:00 PM on Election Day. Depending on the position, you can earn \$100 - \$160 for volunteering as a poll worker!

Volunteering can also be a fundraising opportunity for your service club, school booster club, church group, etc. Earn up to \$900 for your group by staffing an entire precinct board on Election Day and attending training classes.

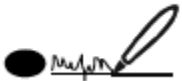

HOW TO FILL OUT YOUR BALLOT



Completely darken the oval next to the candidate's name with **blue or black ink**.



If you are voting for a qualified write-in candidate, you must complete the oval next to the blank line AND write the name of the candidate on that line. **Unless both of these steps are completed, your vote for a write-in candidate cannot be counted.**



Remember to vote both sides of the ballot if both sides are printed.



DO NOT make partial marks when you make your selections. X marks, check marks and other kinds of partial shading on the ovals is not the right way to fill out your ballot.

Did you make a mistake marking your ballot?

Lost it? Damaged it? Never received it?



No problem, here are two options you have:

1. You can request a replacement ballot to be sent to you.
2. You can vote at the Placer County Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 8, 2018.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the last day to register to vote?

State law allows voters to register up until 15 days before the election, which means the deadline to register for the November 6, 2018 General Election is **Monday, October 22nd**. You must be registered by this date in order to receive voting materials in this election. On January 1, 2017, Conditional Voter Registration (CVR) became effective in California. Under this new law, eligible voters who missed the 15 day registration deadline have the opportunity to come to the Elections Office between 14 days prior to Election Day and the day of the Election, and conditionally register to vote.

When does my ballot get counted?

No ballot can be “counted” until the polls close at 8 pm on Election Day. However, state law allows county election offices to begin opening and processing vote by mail ballots up to 10 business days before Election Day.

If you vote by mail, your ballot will usually be processed within 24 hours of arriving at our office. That means that if you mail your ballot back to us early enough, it will be processed before Election Day and become part of the results published at 8 pm.

If you vote at the polls, your ballot will be counted as soon as your precinct supplies are delivered to our elections office in Auburn. These results are typically delivered between 10pm and midnight the night of the election.

The last ballots to be counted are the mail ballots dropped off at the polls, the ones delivered by the post office up to 3 days after the election and the provisional ballots cast at polling places. These ballots are processed during the 30-day period following the election that is known as “Post-Election Canvass.”

What happens to provisional ballots after the election? When are they counted?

Every provisional ballot cast in Placer County is individually reviewed for eligibility. The most frequent reasons for determining a provisional ballot is not eligible to be counted are: the voter is not registered in Placer County or the voter cast a ballot another way (voted by mail or at another precinct). You can find out if your provisional ballot was counted by calling the Elections Office after the post-election canvass is completed.

How do I become a poll worker?

Easy! We have included a form for registering to be a poll worker in this pamphlet including information on the requirements, responsibilities and payments.

I changed my signature since I first registered to vote. Will it matter?

We will make our best effort to match the signature on file to the one we find on the envelope you use to return the ballot. If for any reason we cannot determine it is a match, we will make our best effort to contact you to remedy the challenge so we can process your ballot. If you are unsure of how you signed your most recent registration, we recommend you to call our office and we will mail you a voter registration card, which will allow you to update our records and better match your signature.

IMPORTANT DATES

If you moved within Placer County and did not re-register at your new address, you may still vote, you may also re-register for future elections either at the Elections Office, online or at the polling place for your new address.

October 8, 2018 FIRST DAY TO RECEIVE A VOTE BY MAIL BALLOT

This is the first day our office can issue you a vote by mail ballot. You must be registered to vote in Placer County to receive a ballot from our office.

October 22, 2018 LAST DAY TO REGISTER AND RECEIVE VOTING MATERIALS

You must be registered by this date in order to receive voting materials in this election. If you were already registered in the county and moved within the county but did not re-register, you may vote a provisional ballot at your new polling place or you may also vote at the Elections Office. If you have not registered by this deadline, you may come in to the Elections Office between 14 days prior to Election Day and the day of the Election, and conditionally register to vote.

October 30, 2018 LAST DAY FOR THE ELECTIONS OFFICE TO MAIL YOU A BALLOT

If you are already a permanent vote by mail voter, it is not necessary to return a new application. Your ballot will be mailed to you automatically.

There are four ways to apply for a vote by mail ballot: Telephone, Mail, Email or In Person. Telephone the Elections Office at 530-886-5650 or toll-free in California 1-800-824-8683, email election@placer.ca.gov or complete and return the application for a vote by mail ballot printed on the reverse side of this page. The mailed application must be received by the Elections Office no later than 5:00 PM on this date. Be sure to sign your application, place it in an envelope, and mail it back to the Elections Office.

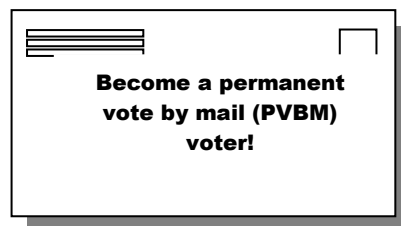
November 6, 2018 RETURNING YOUR VOTED VOTE BY MAIL BALLOT

You may return your ballot by mail or in person to the Elections Office, or you may return your ballot in person on Election Day to any polling place in California. If you are unable to return your ballot personally, you may designate someone to return your ballot for you. If you wish to return your voted ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, November 6th, and received by the Elections Office no later than Friday, November 9th, in order for your ballot to count. We encourage you to mail your ballot on or before October 31st in order for it to arrive on time. If you wish to return your voted ballot in person, it must be hand-delivered on or before 8:00 PM on Election Day. For your convenience, the Elections Office in Auburn has a 24-hour drive-up drop-off ballot box and there are additional ballot drop-off locations in the County – see page DRP for details.

Some voters may not know that state law allows all voters to receive a ballot by mail. Permanent vote by mail (PVBM) voters begin to receive their ballots in the mail about four weeks prior to every election. It gives them time to think about their voting choices, return their ballot on or before Election Day and they do not have to plan time to appear at a specific polling place. Currently in Placer County, two-thirds of all registered voters are PVBM Voters.

To request PVBM status, complete and return the vote by mail application on the back of this sample ballot pamphlet. Make sure to check the box that requests permanent status on the application. Our office will process the application and you will automatically receive a ballot for each election. **If you are already a PVBM Voter, then there is no need to return the application.** Your ballot will automatically be mailed to you. State law requires that we terminate your PVBM status if you fail to return an executed vote by mail ballot for four consecutive statewide general elections; in this case, you would need to re-apply for PVBM status.
