The Des Moines Community Discussion Project

Summary: The following report summarizes key discussion points collected through a series of online and in-person discussions with residents of Des Moines, Iowa. Each discussion was professionally facilitated, lasted approximately 75 minutes, and included a minimum of 4 discussion participants. The upcoming Des Moines school board election was the topic of discussion. Participants were encouraged to explore various dimensions of concern surrounding the school board election. Participants were also encouraged to reframe their concerns into questions that could be posed to school board candidates. Listed below is a consolidated list of possible topics/issues, concerns, and questions that citizens of Des Moines, Iowa expressed as important for the upcoming school board election. The order of items in the list is not intended to reflect participants' priorities, which were not assessed.

	Q: What principles drive your policies for safety in the school? What guidelines would you require for public or private safety officers? What kind of training will they have? Q: In terms of safety, what are we already doing right? What can be improved? How would you improve it? Q: Many community members believe that teachers no longer hold authority over the classroom. Do you believe that this is a concern? How might you address this concern? Q: How might you support the mental health needs of students/faculty/staff? Q: What role should the school play in overseeing homeschooled children?

How might we distinguish our school district in education over the next 20 years? Q: What are the greatest threats facing public education in the future? How might you prepare for these threats now? For example, would a voucher system undermine public education? Q: How might you improve the value of a high school diploma? What should a 21 st century diploma reflect? How might we better prepare students for college and non-college paths? Q: What school districts might we learn from? How would you actively seek out guidance from school districts we would like to emulate? Q: What role do you imagine technology playing in (and outside) the classroom in the future? How would you prepare us for this?

Recruitment Strategy: The recruitment strategy for this pilot involved reaching out to: Ballotpedia readers; approximately 100 neighborhood association officers; career educators; professional facilitators; the dialogue and discussion community; social media groups; and personal contacts. Email, phone, and social media were all used, often in combination. Response rates for this program varied by medium but averaged about 1/100. Replication of this pilot on a wider scale will therefore require that Ballotpedia develop a more workable recruitment strategy, which would: begin several months in advance; include multiple channels; and involve the participation of partner organizations.
